The 11th Annual Missouri Liars Contest 2025 Hannibal, MO

- The Liars Contest was an enormous success in Hannibal, and we owe that success to all the wonderful people who were there before, during and after the event. We had a wonderful team working hard to make it happen.
- The Hannibal Music Academy hosted the Friday, July 11 th event. The free concert of stories and songs from Evie Rodenbaugh, Angela Williams, Karen Young, January Kiefer, Brian Fox Ellis, Jim Two Crows Wallen and Gladys Coggswell inspired the crowd of over 120 listeners. We are grateful to Gale Rublee for putting the concert together and for the grant from the Riedel Foundation in Hannibal.
- On Saturday July 12 th we began the day with a free workshop by January Kiefer. "From the Page to the Stage" captivated the workshop which was well attended. People are still talking about how helpful the workshop was. The Hannibal Arts Council was a good fit for the MO-TELL for the entire day.
- The Mark Twain Boyhood Home and Museum sponsored a concert with Ric Vice telling stories by Mark Twain and other tales to an audience of 22. Later in the afternoon, ten people lined up to compete in the Spoken Missouri Liars Contest. It was all held together by Anthony Clark, our delightful emcee and the creator of the MO-TELL Liars Contest many years ago. This year, as always, the judges had a tough time deciding a winner. An audience of around 45-50 cheered them on.
- Three winners were chosen by the three Hannibal based judges, 1st place: Ken Wolfe, 2nd place: Larry Brown, and 3rd place, Chester Weems. Ken is now a 5-time champion liar!
- There were many entries for the Written Liars Contest. We were lucky to have the 1st and 2nd place winners in the audience on the 12th. The 1st place winner, Chester Weems, read his story.
- Hannibal was a fun place to have the liars contest. But all the people involved made it much more fun. Many, many thanks to the Liars Contest committee who worked so hard with me on this, Gale Rublee, Angela Williams, Karen Young, Sue Hinkel and Perrin Stifel. the MO-TELL board works so hard at these events. Everyone has a unique story to tell! Adults are invited to share their most brought to life on stage by The Repertory Theatre of St. Louis during the captivating stories in audio or text format for a chance to see them 46th annual St. Louis Storytelling Festival, Sunday, November 16.

HOW TO ENTER:

- 1. Think of a story using ONE of these options below:
 - A story about reshaping your narrative.
 - A story about coming of age.
- A story about finding community and friendship.
 - A story about facing childhood fears.
- A story about how you made the biggest mistake of your life.
- A story about a time when you won your own personal Superbowl.
- 2. Create either an audio recording (preferred) or a written version of your story.
- 3. Complete the online entry form at www.slcl.org/your-story-on-stage with your original story between August 16-September 15, 2025.

OFFICIAL RULES AND GUIDELINES:

- Adults 18 and up are encouraged to enter.
- Your story must pertain to one of the options listed above.
- You may submit multiple stories, but only one may be chosen.
- The story should be told in the first person.
- (preferred) or a written version of your story You may submit either an audio recording
- length. File types accepted are m4a, mp3, Audio recording between 5-10 minutes in mp4, wma, wav.
- File types accepted are pdf, doc, docx, txt, rtf. Written story between 750-1000 words.

- Entries must be received between August 16-September 15, 2025
- and adapted for the stage by The Repertory All submissions will be reviewed, selected. Theater of St. Louis.
- If your story is selected, St. Louis County Library will notify you by October 6, 2025.
- The Repertory Theater of St. Louis during the 46th Annual St. Louis Storytelling Festival on The selected stories will be performed by Sunday, November 16, 1:00 p.m. at the Clark Family Branch.
- Video recording of the performances is prohibited.



The Ballad of Hilary Kuntz

Hilary has been the webmaster for the MO-TELL.org website since 2018. During that time, she created a new website, making it more usable, while keeping elements of the old website. When asked what she liked about being the webmaster she said it gave her an opportunity to organize things and to showcase storytellers and their content.

The downside she said was that getting information and content from storytellers can be like herding cats: "the type of cat that stays out all night and has a glorious time, climbing trees, exploring the town, then cheerfully bringing you a half-dead mouse as a souvenir of its' conquests.

In her day job she is the English Language Training Program Coordinator for Catholic Charities of NE Kansas. She likes to read, cook, and weave (which explains the loom setup in the living room). Her eventual goal is to get a PhD in Linguistics focusing on Second Language Acquisition for Pre-literate Adults and Language Deprived Students.

She wants to explore the effects of storytelling on language learning.

Her favorite story was told at an early Kansas City Storytelling Celebration when she was 9 or 10 years old. A local teller shared a story about the Spanish bringing horses to the New World. She has only heard that story one time and doesn't know the name of the teller, but she said, "I still remember how I felt and the hush of the audience as the teller spoke."

The congregation of St. Louis' historic Memorial Presbyterian Church grieves the devastation wrought by the May 16th EF-3 tornado. While our 1926 English gothic bell tower, sanctuary and arts venue, The Chapel, still anchor the western edge of Forest Park, and while our people still gather for weekly worship, millions of dollars and many months of work lie ahead to restore the structure to its historic glory. You can follow the progress being made below.

which is instrumental in feeding and housing the poor, who were hit hard by this tornado. Some of the MO-TELL members have asked how they may donate to help people in St. Louis who are in need due to the tornado. This will be an opportunity to help victims of the May 16 tornado.

The Fountain Park neighborhood (just east of Kingshighway and north of Delmar) was hit hard by the tornado, in which 5,000 homes, churches, and businesses were destroyed or significantly damaged. The Centennial Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), which has served the community for more than 100 years, was damaged beyond repair. One woman died in the church during the tornado; she had just finished feeding the poor. Two other women in the church were rescued by first responders.

The congregation plans to rebuild within two years and establish a health clinic, food bank, and housing in its mission of "Health, Hunger, and Home." Donations will help the neighborhood now and in its future rebuilding.

Crack Shot

So they went off into the woods all by themselves, turned back-to-back, stepped off 20 paces and turned around. Then they counted to three, raised their rifles, and fired.
