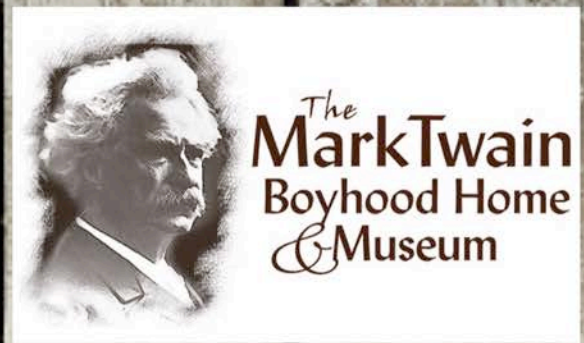

MORE TIPS FOR TELLERS!

This is a modified version of an article by Lynn Rubright, author of Beyond the Beanstalk, Interdisciplinary Learning Through Storytelling. Lynn is the creator of *Project Tell*, a program involving storytelling and other arts in an elementary setting targeting 3rd graders.

How to Tell a Story in an Hour

1. The first time, tell a short tale that you know and love.
2. Read the story thinking about the pictures you see and the pictures you want your audience to see.
3. Work with the words. Write or record the story using your own words. Listen for colors, the setting and the music of the tale.
4. “Tell” your story silently and watch your gestures. Be brave enough to use a pause, to create an effective moment.
5. Tell your story over and over until you are comfortable with it. Tell the story to yourself.
6. Leave your words and pictures alone and re-read the original story to pick up any details you may have overlooked.
7. PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE.
8. Trust the power of the tale and “TELL IT.” As you concentrate on the story your nervousness will lessen, and the story itself will grow.

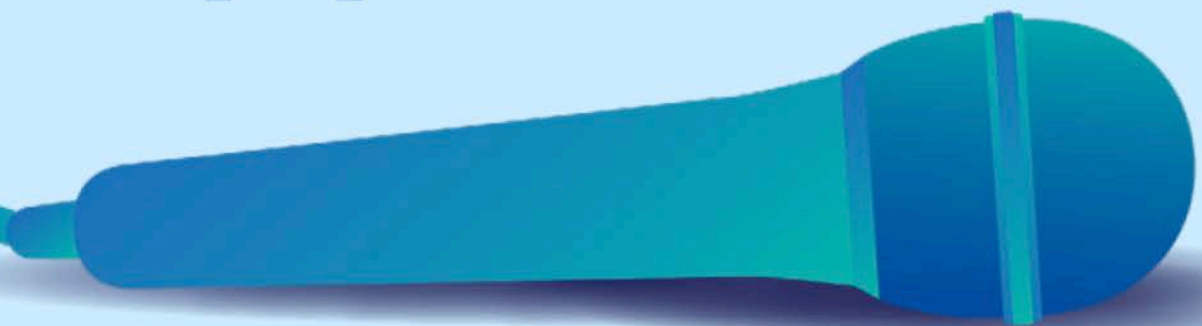

Jim "Two Crows" Wallen educated and fascinated the public at the First Missouri State Capitol Historic Site!



I arrived at 8:30 am to set up for my 30-minute performances at 10:30, 11:30 and 1:30. They provided one table and I brought a second one to display my furs and artifacts. I took furs, and games the Native American, and pioneer children played.

I was in a very crowded area 2' behind me was Bubba the 3yr old sheep who was constantly escaping his pen or bleating continually. To my right only 2' away was the World Bird Sanctuary with a Bald eagle, a falcon, a screech owl and a hoot owl. Not an easy place to tell.

Attendance was down over the time I was last there. Probably because of the storms and St. Louis tornado the day before. The attendance for my 3 performances was approximately 50 people total. But visited with another 200 people as they came by to check out the furs and games.

One family came specifically to see me because they had seen me two years ago when I had been there. I packed up and left at 2:30pm.

The congregation of St. Louis' historic Memorial Presbyterian Church grieves the devastation wrought by the May 16th EF-3 tornado. While our 1926 English gothic bell tower, sanctuary and arts venue, The Chapel, still anchor the western edge of Forest Park, and while our people still gather for weekly worship, millions of dollars and many months of work lie ahead to restore the structure to its historic glory. You can follow the progress being made below.

which is instrumental in feeding and housing the poor, who were hit hard by this tornado. Some of the MO-TELL members have asked how they may donate to help people in St. Louis who are in need due to the tornado. This will be an opportunity to help victims of the May 16 tornado.

The Fountain Park neighborhood (just east of Kingshighway and north of Delmar) was hit hard by the tornado, in which 5,000 homes, churches, and businesses were destroyed or significantly damaged. The Centennial Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), which has served the community for more than 100 years, was damaged beyond repair. One woman died in the church during the tornado; she had just finished feeding the poor. Two other women in the church were rescued by first responders.

The congregation plans to rebuild within two years and establish a health clinic, food bank, and housing in its mission of "Health, Hunger, and Home." Donations will help the neighborhood now and in its future rebuilding.

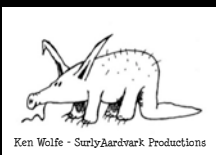
