





A HEAPIN' HELPIN' OF MO-TELL HISTORY FROM BOBBY NORFOLK

Q. Were you there when MO-TELL began?

Yes, I was at the first MO-TELL meeting. The reason I was there is because the St. Louis Storytelling Festival started at the Arch where I worked - at the Old Courthouse. So, it was hard for me to escape MO-TELL and its members. I didn't seek storytelling, it sought me.

The three guilds were very tight, very strong then. It was not only **MO-TELL**, but it was **Gateway** and **Riverwind**. Irene Eveland and Ruthilde Kronberg were a part of MO-TELL and Marilyn Kinsella was part of the Riverwind connection.

Initial meetings were at Perrin Stifel's house. David Schlamb was co-chair. January Keifer, Irene Eveland, Ruthilde Kronberg, Annette Harrison, and Lynn Rubright all sat in Perrin and Alice's living room many times trying to create MO-TELL. Sue Hinkel was the scribe. She took the minutes.

Q. Did you hold an office with MO-TELL?

I didn't hold an office, but I was an avant member because I was totally excited about what I felt was a new concept called storytelling. I was doing Black Repertory Theater plays with Ron Himes. I was with Zack and Mack in the night clubs doing the Rubber Band Man Comedy Show.

When the *St. Louis Storytelling Festival* started at the Arch and the Old Courthouse in 1980 and some of the first storytellers started coming to the Arch, that's when everybody got started.

The storytelling world caught fire right after that.

I think MO-TELL was a much stronger guild than Gateway and Riverwind. Some of the people overlapped. You could be in all three guilds. It wasn't like a fraternity or sorority. I had membership in all three.

Q. What Missouri Storytelling Festivals do you remember?

I was on the Golden Rod Showboat with Jimmy Neal Smith from Jonesborough. We rode up and down the river telling stories.

Q. Did you ever tell at one of the Missouri State Park Storytelling Series events?

I remember performing at a state park out by Columbia, MO. They wanted stories about fishing. The state park had a fishing festival and there were a bunch of kids and their parents. I told stories at lakeside about tall tales of fish.

One of the turning points of MO-TELL was when they had the weekend retreats. I saw Jackie Torrence at one of those retreats. She was my mentor.

Q. Most Vivid Memory Ever?

A vivid memory of one of those retreats was when I saw a female Jungian psychologist, I can't remember her name, who did an amazing psychological experiment using colors and people's intuition. She had different colored cloths like hand towels. She made a circle of chairs and put the different colored fabrics on the backs of the chairs. All of us were told to slowly walk around these chairs and if you felt an intuition or urge to sit in one of those chairs with that color, sit. If somebody was already sitting there, stand behind them. It took about ten minutes for that to happen.

When everybody was done, the psychologist put out a chart. Annette Harrison didn't want to be part of that exercise. Nobody knew why she didn't want to be part of it. Neither did the FBI guy, Warren Wyman. He sat on the side. Warren had done this session before and was astonished by what had happened. Fast forward, Nan Kammann(-Judd) sat in one chair with a cloth like the desert southwest of Arizona. Since she was already there, I stood behind her.

Everybody sat or stood and she asked this one guy what his profession was. He said that he was an attorney. According to the chart, she said that he was sitting in the "law giver" section of the circle. She asked somebody else why they sat where they were. The person said that they love Halloween. That's when Annette spoke up and said that when she did the Jungian circle before, she was wearing all black with red fingernails and didn't know that she was sitting in the "witches" section. I remember Warren Wyman said he was rehearsing ghost and horror stories at the time at another session and he sat in the "witch/demon" section.

The psychologist told Perrin Stifel he was sitting in the "tradition" section of the circle. He confirmed that he invites all family, extended family, and friends over for holidays. If they don't come, he and Alice will go to them. Perrin said that he loves tradition.

The psychologist asked Nan Kammann(-Judd) what her profession was. She said that she was the Artistic Director of the St. Louis Storytelling Festival, and the psychologist told her she was sitting in the desert southwest and that is the section of the "storyteller." Then she looked at me and asked me what my profession was. I said, "Storytelling" and everybody laughed. She nailed it on everybody! That was a weekend getaway I'll never forget. Everyone that is still here, and was there on that weekend, knows about that event.

Q. An AHA! Memory

I've had several aha moments, but the biggest aha moment was when I found out from MO-TELL that storytelling is not just for babies. I thought it was just children's storytelling in libraries with little kids sitting on carpet squares.

I found out all these tellers were coming in from all around the world making thousands of dollars a show. I said, "Aha!" I was working at the National Park Service. I asked the Chief Ranger if I could work for him Wednesday-Saturday so I could work in the schools Monday-Tuesday and said, "Go for it!"

Q. Tellabration!

I attended many Tellabration! annually in Jonesborough. I was good friends with J. G. "Paw Paw" Pinkerton. We were on a few festivals together around the United States. He invented Tellabration! and it has outlived him by many, many years.


